

Inspiring all to have the **Courage to Care**

N an initiative that aligns with this year's Catholic Education Week theme of engaging minds, igniting hearts and serving others, Catholic Education is bringing the Courage to Care Exhibition to the Far North from August 14 to September 11.

This once in a lifetime exhibition demonstrates the importance of standing up against discrimination, bullying and all prejudice behaviour, through the use of one of the last century's most extreme examples, The Holocaust.

The general public and students from all schools will have the rare opportunity to hear first-hand from Holocaust survivors and their rescuers of how having the 'Courage to Care' played such an important role in ensuring as positive an outcome as possible during such an horrific and life changing event.

Courage to Care aims to highlight the problems of bullying, racism and discrimination and demonstrate that each person within the community can speak out and make a difference, and help prevent bullying and other prejudice behaviours – in schools, workplaces and beyond.

With curriculum links in History, Geography and Religious Education, the exhibition aligns with Catholic Education's philosophy to make a difference in the lives of individuals and in the wider community by challenging young people, through God, to find meaning and value in their lives and reach their full potential as compassionate, contributing life-giving members of society who are highly skilled, informed, tolerant, open and just.



Catholic schools seek to develop in students, communal obligations and aspirations, to espouse values which unite society and to promote citizenship infused by a commitment to social justice – just as the Courage to Care exhibition does.

This community outreach initiative is being brought to Cairns by Catholic Education and will be at the Seville Mercy Conference Centre, Bauhinia Ave (One Raladava Rd), Earlville from 14 August to 11 September. It is open to all schools and the general public for a gold coin donation.

Beginning in 1999, the exhibition has been shown to over 190,000 visitors including 80,000 students across New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia and the ACT.

Catholic Education's Assistant Executive Director Identity and Mission, Colin Harvey, said the exhibition was a never to be repeated opportunity. Students in Years 5-12 will have

a guided tour of the exhibition, hear a Holocaust survivor's positive story first hand and take part in a facilitated workshop.

"Courage to Care empowers participants to take positive action in relation to discrimination and bullying in all forms, from the school yard to the workplace – not to be bystanders, but to make a difference whenever possible.

"The program has relevance for everyone. It challenges our thinking and our perceptions and has the potential to change our behaviour," Mr Harvey said.

"Courage to Care encourages young people to make a stand against injustice and to be part of shaping our community for the future. It encourages the development of an intelligent, peaceful society, with understanding and respect for all minority groups."

The exhibition is open to the general public Monday to Friday 9am – 5pm and Sundays 2-4pm. Two hour guided sessions are available on Sunday mornings. Bookings for guided sessions are essential.


